

Bishop James Chadwick

Bishop Chadwick was an Anglo-Irish Roman Catholic priest. He was the second Bishop of Hexham and Newcastle, and is famous for writing the lyrics of the song *Angels We Have Heard on High*. He is remembered as a man of great personal dignity and charm, and for his gentleness of manner.

He was born 24 April 1813, Drogheda, Ireland and died 14 May 1882, Newcastle-upon-Tyne. He is buried at Ushaw College.

Following over a year of work we were very proud to launch our new Trust Mass Setting - Gaudete. We worked with our schools, our parishes and our local communities to write a Mass Setting inspired by them, with the support of acclaimed composter Will Todd. Gaudete has the support of the National Liturgy Office, and can be used by our schools and our parishes.

The Celebration of Mass brings together our communities. We wanted to create a Mass Setting that our pupils and our communities had the opportunity to contribute to, so that it was both inclusive and familiar. Helping everyone join together, and feel at home during the Sacrament.

Composer, Will Todd, worked with the Trust and composed the music for the Gaudete Mass, he said: "It's been an amazing project to be part of. I started off with listening to lots of ideas that the children had, inspired by religious texts, artwork, poems, bits of music, stained glass that they designed, which was incredibly inspiring.

"Then we did a series of five workshops in schools and we wrote music together. Each school created a completely different piece of music which was another layer of inspiration for me. I was particularly pleased that one of the pieces of music that we created in a session at the schools is used in the final Mass Setting.

"Finally, I listened to a lot of songs that the children said made them rejoice, because Gaudete means rejoice. I had playlists from all the schools. It was very upbeat and very positive music and that's what I tried to do with the Gaudete. Hopefully, people will sing it for a long time."

The first public use of Gaudete was at the Catholic Leaders and Clergy Conference in November. All our schools and parishes have free access to download the finished musical score to use any versions or parts they wish in their Mass Setting. RAAC Update

Mitigation work is underway in both our primary schools affected by RAAC (St. James and St. John Bosco Catholic Primary Schools) and we should have pupils back in school before the end of May. Both schools have also been added to the national school rebuilding programme, which is wonderful news.

St. Bede Catholic School and Byron Sixth Form has three blocks affected by RAAC and works began in late April to carry out roof replacements on these blocks.

School Rebuilding

The Trust now has six schools currently in the national School Rebuilding Programme. Work is progressing with St. Aidan's Catholic Academy now in the tender submission stage of procurement. St. Patrick's Catholic Primary is expected to start the procurement stage in the coming months.

St. Mary's Catholic Primary, Sunderland and St. Aloysius Infants are also in the early stages of planning for rebuilds, plus we have had St. James Catholic Primary and St. John Bosco Catholic Primary added to the scheme for future rebuilds. So exciting times ahead for all of these schools!



2024: Year of Prayer



In preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year 'Pilgrims of Hope', 2024 has been designated a Year of Prayer.

The Holy Father has asked that 2024 be year of prayer, as a preparatory year for the Jubilee. This will start in Advent 2023.

In preparation for the Jubilee, the Dioceses are invited to promote initiatives to remind people of the centrality of both individual prayer and community prayer. The Lord's Prayer offers us a great opportunity to go back to the basics of prayer.

PARISH PROFILE

In each issue we will be talking to one of our Parish Priests. This time it is **Fr. David Russell** who looks after North Sunderland which consists of **Sacred Heart, St. Benet's, St Hilda's and St. John Bosco parishes.** He works closely with two of our primary schools English Martyrs and St. John Bosco.

How long have you been a priest? And how long have you been at your current parishes? 34 years in November. I have been in my current parishes since 13 September 2019.

What led you to your calling as a priest? My calling to ministry as a priest was a long journey. As a teaching student in Leeds, I lodged with a family who suggested I should become a priest, and I'd laugh. In my final year I had some mental health issues, during recovery the thought of being a priest resurfaced. I talked to the college chaplain who encouraged me to apply. After two years at Ushaw seminary I thought about leaving, it was then I became aware I was totally free to leave, that God wouldn't think the less of me and would always love me whatever I'd choose in life. I imagined both options and discovered that if I stayed on the path, I would be happy, fulfilled and stretched and life would be an adventure.



What is a typical day like for you? I don't know about other priests, but I struggle to define what is typical apart from prayer, daily Mass and meeting and being with people. Plans are regularly blown out of the water by unexpected visits or emergency situations. Often you find yourself in new situations which challenge and stretch you. You really do need to depend upon God to help and guide you. Talking to Jesus about all sorts of things during the day is a constant.

What do you enjoy most about your role and what is your biggest challenge? I enjoy being with people, getting people together, enjoying people's company in laughter and conversation. There's something unique in each person reflecting a particular aspect or characteristic of God in a way no one else does. The biggest challenge is to help people realise for themselves that they are unconditionally loved by God, that they can accept that we are all loved not because of our looks or what we do or achieve but because we are sons and daughters of God, and God's nature is love.

What is your favourite time of year? I find the change of seasons and yearly celebrations like Christmas, Easter and so on all have their particular attractions and interest.

What do you enjoy most about working with schools and young people? I have my parishes to look after, but still find some time to visit schools, though not as often as I would like. I feel for young people who are under enormous pressures to conform, particularly the 24/7 world of social media, plus the pressure of issues of climate change and environmental damage.

What are your hobbies? Gardening – I love to grow plants indoors and outdoors: my office/sitting room is a jungle of tropical plants – all I need is a parrot, a monkey and David Attenborough to complete the scene! I enjoy cycling, walking and all sorts of music. I love the US drama 'The Chosen' which depicts the last 3 years of Jesus through the experience of those who met him.

What advice do you have for our young people? I dare you to switch off your smart phone for one hour each evening. If that sounds shocking, or impossible, or insane – you're addicted to your phone, or your phone posesses you and not the other way round. Be radical, be different – you can survive without what seems to be essential but only you can find out for yourself.

PUPIL PERSPECTIVE



Each issue we want to give one of our pupils the opportunity to speak about something that is important to them. This issue we talked to **St. Wilfrid's RC College student Luke Hall**, 18, who is Member of Youth Parliament (MYP) for South Tyneside Young People's Parliament (STYPP). Their campaigns have included free school meals and child health.

What year are you in and what are you currently studying? Year 13 studying A levels in computer science, politics and English literature.

What have you enjoyed most about your school and college experience? I love the sense of community at St Wilfrid's. Overall, I have had the time of my life and they have brilliant facilities and teaching staff.

Why did you join the Young People's Parliament and what do you enjoy about it? I have always been interested in helping others so when I attended a STYPP event, I knew it was for me. I was elected in March 2022 and my two-year post has recently finished. The role has definitely developed me as a person.

You had the chance to visit Westminster - what was the experience like? I have had the chance to speak twice in the House of Commons in November 2022 and November 2023 to debate the issue of free school meals. I think I would have been pretty scared talking in Parliament if it wasn't something that mattered so much to me.

What are your aspirations for the future? I am excited to be going to University College London to study politics and international relations. I am a member of Bite Back, a youth activist group, and we're campaigning for school food to be accessible and nutritious. I think the Trust does this well but so many others don't. I recently appeared on BBC Politics to talk about this. Long-term, I want to become an MP or go into policy.

Why is it important for young people to have a voice and be heard? It's important now more than ever. Young people are facing unprecedented issues. When people meet me, what is often said is 'He is an extraordinary young person' but I'm not the only one; so many of my peers are driving positive change for young people and it's important that our voices are heard.

He was asked questions by pupils all morning. Pupils said, "He shared how important our world is and why we need to look after it.", "We feel very lucky that Bishop Stephen came to visit our school.", "We learned about the Bishop's mitre and crosier."





In the Spring term Bishop Stephen also visited **Our Lady of Lourdes, Shotton.** A lovely Mass was held in the Parish then the Bishop shared information about his life and his calling to his vocation and what it was like to be asked by the Pope to become a Bishop.

The visit coincided with the Feast day of Our Lady of Lourdes on 11th February so it was a very special occasion for everyone connected to the school community.

The Bishop was presented with a special book with pages made by each class in school and a prayer card with a medal of Our Lady, the school Mission Statement and a tea light to show that we always try to let our light shine.





IBishop Stephen also visited **St. Cuthbert's and St. Mary Magdalen's Catholic Primary schools in Seaham**. He celebrated Mass in St. Cuthbert's with Y5/6 from St. Cuthberts and Y6 from St. Mary Magdalen's. He then had a tour of each school, taking questions from the children in each class.

In March Martin Scott, Author (and the Trust's Assistant Estates Manager) visited **St. Gregory's, South Shields,** as part of their World Book Week celebrations.

He talked to pupils about his book, The Stuttering Coach and read his book to the pupils. Two Year 6 pupils interviewed Martin using questions from their classmates.

Adam, Year 4 said, "Mr Scott is just like me. I saw he had a stammer before anyone else noticed. I liked his story about the stuttering coach."

Cherry-Bo, Year 6 said, "I think Mr Scott is really brave to write this about himself and to share it and read it in front of the entire school. It was brilliant."

All of our schools have a keen interest in charitable endeavours, here are just a few...

Students from **St. Joseph's Catholic Academy**, **Hebburn**, have been working with local charities to support some of the most vulnerable people in their communities. In the run up to both Christmas and Easter, students have the chance to collate care packages containing essentials and goods such as tea, chocolates, biscuits, warm items of clothing, books etc. These items are then made into care packages and donated to elderly parishioners within the Hebburn community. They are often gifted to individuals who are residents in local care homes and who may struggle with loneliness, bereavement, or dementia.

Many of our schools have also had cause for celebration for example...

In November pupils from **St. Joseph's Catholic Primary**, **Sunderland** helped celebrate 150 years of their parish church St. Joseph's. St. Joseph's RC Church first opened its doors in Millfield on 16 October 1873. The grand opening of the building was celebrated by Bishop Chadwick who also laid the foundation stone.

The Church doubled as a school and chapel and had seating for 500 people. To mark the anniversary, the school community held a Celebration of the Word in church led by children in Key Stage 2, followed by a celebration in school.





In January **St. Bede's Catholic Primary, Jarrow** celebrated its 110th anniversary. The site originally housed a hospital and once a school, it was divided into separate infants and junior schools.

An exhibition was held in school which included old photographs, newspaper cuttings and even logbooks from 1914.

Some of the school's former pupils are now members of staff at St. Bede's, this includes Monica Relf, who has worked at the primary school for more than 20 years as a teaching assistant.



"I have always been involved with St. Bede's school and the church," she said. "It was immensely special to return as a member of staff having enjoyed being a pupil here," she said. "The inside of the school has dramatically changed.

Charlotte Newbrook, aged 10 from Year 5, said: "It was good to compare what life was like in the past at St. Bede's to what it's like today."

St Oswald's Catholic Primary, South Shields will be celebrating their 60th Anniversary this summer. One of the very first pupils got in touch with school and they are working together to organise a special celebration event in June 2024. They are hoping to invite pupils from the first ever class back in to school to meet current pupils and perhaps have a coffee morning and further celebrations.

It was a lovely morning and those attending got to decorate biscuits, make baubles and wreaths and decorate Christmas trees. It was great to see so many families coming along and getting involved.









St. Aidan's Catholic Academy, Sunderland has its very own allotment, which is not only used by its pupils to grow vegetables for the school kitchens, it is also used by the wider community.

RE teacher Anna Armstrong has been coordinating the project, she said: "Our allotment is thriving and we are building cross-generational relationships by working with local nurseries, primary schools and care homes. We have hosted a number of community events.

It's helping us work towards our sustainability goals, creates lovely fresh produce and our students and the community can get involved - so it's a winner all round."

As a Trust we are very much aware of the importance of ensuring our pupils get the best meals to allow them to get the most from their education. That is why we made the decision to bring all our catering in-house, here we talk to our Trust Catering Manager, Karen Reiling.

"It is vitally important to us as a Trust that we provide freshly prepared, healthy and nutritionally balanced meals for our pupils to ensure that they are fueled to get the most out of each school day. We use fresh ingredients and the majority of our meals are homemade by our chefs in our kitchens. We have a fantastic team of staff right across the Trust who are all enthusiastic about providing our pupils with the best school meals."







"Our menu planning always starts with the School Food Standards - so we can ensure our meals are fully compliant. It is really important to us to provide quality food, so where possible, all of our dishes are homemade from scratch. We limit the amount of processed food we have on our menu's and we don't add salt during the preparation process. All of our desserts have 30% less sugar in them and a third of our dessert choices are fruit based each week.

As part of the Trust's commitment to sustainability, we regularly review food miles and continue to work to reduce food waste. We are also beginning to develop sustainable kitchens where we grow our own produce to mitigate the impact of rising food costs. For example, St. Aidan's Catholic Academy in Sunderland has a thriving allotment, pupils regularly gather produce that is used by the kitchens in school meals."


