This award is to celebrate someone who is positive and full of enthusiasm, who has gone above and beyond to support pupils. Your nomination should include what the person's role or roles are in your school. It should give some examples of what they have done, how that impacted on pupils, and why they deserve to receive this award. This could be by providing additional support, a consistent friendly face, leading on new opportunities or championing pupil causes in school, or being an inspiring role model.

Over the past year **St. Mary's Catholic Primary, Sunderland** celebrated 50 years. They marked this milestone with a range of activities including a whole school Mass, the first ever "Maryfest" rock festival, featuring music and dancing from 1974 (the year school opened), a picnic lunch (with ice cream), and a ceilidh dance. Many past students and staff attended events, and everyone loved the opportunity to re-connect.

School also commissioned four special stained-glass panels to add to their Mission Statement window (created for their fortieth anniversary). The panels depict the four values of school's BREW curriculum, Belief, Rights, Environment and Wellbeing. They were produced by Gill McGinley, the artist who did the original window, and have been framed and now are displayed proudly in the main corridor. A constant reminder of the values which make St. Mary's so special.

Our Buildings





Over the summer we carried out a number of projects at several of our schools including roofing replacement works, toilet upgrades, flooring replacements, outdoor nursery area upgrades and health and safety and safeguarding essential works such as fencing and security installations.

Thank you to the school communities of Our Lady of the Rosary Catholic Primary, Peterlee, St. Bede's Catholic Primary, Jarrow, St. Cuthbert's Catholic Primary, Seaham, St. Gregory's Catholic Primary, South Shields, St. Joseph's Catholic Academy, Hebburn, St. Leonard's Catholic Primary, Sunderland, St. Matthew's Catholic Primary, Jarrow, St Joseph's, Catholic Primary, Sunderland, St. Mary Magdalen Catholic Primary, Seaham and St. Oswald's Catholic Primary, South Shields, for their patience and understanding during these improvements.

These works will have a huge impact on the teaching and learning in our schools. One of the advantages of being part of our Trust family of schools is the support we can provide as a Trust with property and estates maintenance, management, and improvement.

School Rebuilding Programme



We successfully secured funding under the <u>Department for Education's (DfE) School</u>
<u>Rebuilding Programme</u>. Work is progressing well at **St. Aidan's Catholic Academy** and **St. Patrick's Catholic Primary School**, both in Sunderland, with building works expected to start early in 2025.

St. Mary's Catholic Primary School, Sunderland, and St. Aloysius Catholic Infant School, Hebburn are both in tranche four of the DfE School Rebuilding Programme. St. James Catholic Primary School, Hebburn and St. John Bosco Catholic Primary School, Sunderland have also been added to the rebuilding programme, with timelines to be advised.

RAAC Update

At the end of the summer holidays (August 2023), we were advised by the Department for Education (DfE) that three of our schools had Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC) and these sites should close or partially close.

St. James Catholic Primary School, Hebburn and **St. John Bosco Catholic Primary School, Sunderland** both returned to their school buildings in June 2024 following remedial works - we are delighted they have now been added to the school rebuilding programme. Work is ongoing at **St. Bede's Catholic School and Byron Sixth Form, Peterlee.** All students are now back on the school site. The DfE continue to provide us with support for this project which is due to be completed January 2025.

We would like to thank all our pupils, staff, parents/carers, and wider communities for all their support and understanding.

St. Anthony's Girls Catholic Academy, Sunderland, is for girls aged 11-18 years, within the Mercy tradition. PARISH PROFILE

In each issue we will be talking to one of our Parish Priests. This time it is **Fr. Saji Thottathil** who looks after **St. Matthew's and St. Mary's parishes, Jarrow**. He also works closely with our primary schools St. Matthew's and St. Mary's, Jarrow

How long have you been a priest? and how long have you been at your current parishes? 25 years. I have been in my current parishes since 28 February 2015.

What lead you to your calling as a priest? My calling to the priesthood was inspired by the selfless service of my parish priest, whose dedication to the community left a profound impact on me. I always want to do something good for others. After completing secondary school, I participated in a discerning program with my friends, which provided clarity and guidance.

What is a typical day like for you? It varies greatly, there are constants, like daily Mass and personal prayer, which are at the heart of my routine. However, much of my day revolves around responding to the unexpected. For example, if there's an emergency, such as a request for the Sacrament of the Sick in a care home or hospital, my plans must adapt to meet those needs. I've learned that the needs of the people often come before my personal schedule, and I cannot manage these demands without guidance and strength from God. I try to find moments to connect with family and friends, as these relationships provide balance and support.



What do you enjoy most about your role and what is your biggest challenge? Celebrating the Holy Mass and administering the sacraments, as these are joyful occasions that deepen my connection with God and the community. Assisting people in times of crisis is the biggest challenge (such as bereavement, terminal illness, or job loss). As priests, we are called to be another Christ in the world, and the real challenge lies in how to extend Christ's care, love, and compassion in these critical moments.

What is your favourite time of year? Spring and summer for their warmth and vibrant energy. In the liturgical year, I especially enjoy Christmas and Easter, as times of joy, reflection, and celebration.

What do you enjoy most about working with schools and young people? The opportunity to spend time with our pupils, especially during Holy Mass and liturgical celebrations. Young people are the future of our society and church, and the love and joy they bring to my ministry is truly remarkable. It is a privilege to witness their growth and enthusiasm in faith.

What are your hobbies? My hobbies are reading, walking, watching sports and socialising with friends and family.

What advice do you have for our young people? Youth is the most precious period of your life. It is a time filled with boundless creativity and potential—gifts that God has given you. Use this creativity to make a positive impact on your community and the world around you. Jesus is the best celebrity and the truest friend you could ever have. No matter what circumstances you face, He is always there to guide you. In today's world of consumerism and technological advancement, never lose sight of who you are. Embrace your individuality, for you are made with great intention and love.

Pope Francis announced that 2025 will be a year of Jubilee. The theme of the year will be "Pilgrims of Hope," hope for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing effects COVID-19 pandemic, and a climate crisis.

Within the Catholic Church, Jubilees or as they are sometimes known, 'Holy Years' have always been special years for forgiveness, reconciliation, and mercy. The year is a special year of grace, it's about pilgrimage and prayer as well as celebration and reconciliation.

Jubilee years traditionally have begun just before Christmas and end the Epiphany the following year. This year Pope Francis opened the first Holy Door on Christmas Eve at the Papal Basilica of St. Peter in Rome and then presided over the Mass for the Lord's birth. Pope Francis in Spes Non Confundit (Hope Does Not Disappoint), the Papal Bull officially proclaiming the Holy Year of 2025 explained that the in Catholic tradition, the Holy Door represents the passage to salvation — the path to a new and eternal life, which was opened to humanity by Jesus."

For our schools, the launch of the Jubilee took place on Friday 24 January 2025 with the opening their own Holy Doors. Each month will have a theme that we are invited to explore.

On Friday 27 June 2025 we will join together with schools across the Diocese for a **Jubilee Day**. During the day, schools are invited to reflect on their mission and to commit to stand in solidarity with the poorest communities, sharing hope and challenging injustice by pledging to take concrete actions to make their communities, country, and world a better place, being that Pilgrim of Hope.

PUPIL PERSPECTIVE

Each issue we want to give one of our pupils the opportunity to speak about something that is important to them.

This issue we talked to **Louca Cooke**, 15, from St. Bede Catholic School and Byron Sixth Form, Peterlee.

He is part of the Elite Football Academy programme in school in partnership with Fast Feet Football Academy.



What year are you in and what are you currently studying? I'm in Year 10 at St. Bede's Catholic School and Byron Sixth Form in Peterlee studying English language and literature, maths, triple science, geography, engineering and BTEC sport.

Why did you decide to join the Elite Football Academy programme? I have always loved football. I have played since I was four or five and play in centre midfield position. I'm a Hartlepool United fan and love watching them play too.

How does the programme combine your academic studies and your football coaching? The football sessions are only before and after school, so you don't miss any lessons. I have two early mornings from 7.30am and two after school from 3.15pm-5pm. I don't mind the early mornings as I'm used to getting up early and it wakes me up more, gets me active and I feel better in lessons.

What have you enjoyed most about the experience so far? I enjoy the games and going out of school with the lads. It is nice and active, and I really enjoy the training. I've known the group for the past couple of years and the coaches are great.

How does having the opportunity to include football in your school curriculum benefit you? It makes me want to come into school on the days you feel ill; it gives you another reason to come into school. I'm a very loud, active person so playing football and having extra coaching is great.

Would you recommend the programme to other students? Definitely. As long as you love playing football, you will love it.

What are your aspirations for the future? I am looking into going to America to do a football scholarship programme after college. My Dad's friend did it and put the idea in my head, so I started looking into it.

Success of all pupils: Our schools are situated in some of the highest deprivation areas in the country. A commitment to all pupils regardless of background is central to our vision. We aim to ensure the highest quality provision, comprehensive support services and characterbuilding enrichment activities that promote the formation of the whole child. Resource allocation: Optimising resource allocation across central services and provision will enable every school to maximise resources to best support teaching and learning for every child.

Data informed decision making: The production of the strategic planning portal and associated data dashboards are providing a wealth of data insight that enables leaders to effectively identify key strategic priorities and make informed decisions about pupil progress and barriers to learning.

Our approach operates in two dimensions: within individual schools and horizontally across the Trust. This model allows us to foster impactful collaboration, recognising the unique needs of each school while promoting unity across the Trust. Walking alongside our school leaders and staff, we aim to strengthen individual capabilities while leveraging the power of our network of schools for collective improvement.

We firmly believe that sharing best practice, collective goals and collaboration will foster positive change and continuous improvement.

Sharing strategic oversight

Our Trust has taken an innovative approach to managing the sharing of performance data across the Trust. In partnership with <u>Data2Action</u>, we have developed a Strategic Portal using Power BI. This online tool allows us to align strategic planning across the entire Trust, providing high visibility to all stakeholders of key strategic priorities and importantly the ability at a school and Trust level to track the progress of these collective priorities against clearly defined Key Performance Indicators.



Through enhanced accessibility, visibility of all plans, automation of processes and significant data insight, leaders have seen a significant reduction in workload across all levels of the organisation.

Networking

They provide an opportunity to say what is working well and together agree areas for improvement, providing staff with a fantastic opportunity to provide peer support and continue their own professional development.

We also provide opportunities for other teams within the Trust to get together and share learning. Our Business Leads from each school regularly catch up via our Business Leaders Network, and other teams like as our Chadwick's Kitchen catering teams have cluster sessions to share best practice.







Classroom Visualisers

A classroom visualiser allows teachers to show items to pupils through a projector or a connection to an interactive touchscreen. Pupils can then see what the teacher is doing on a much larger screen, rather than crowding round a single desk. Providing a simple yet powerful tool to enhance teaching and learning.

As a Trust we have been undertaking a pilot of use of classroom visualisers in several of our primary and secondary schools to assess how they may be used in the future.

Liam Milne, Assistant Headteacher (Teaching & Learning) at St. Anthony's Girls Catholic Academy, Sunderland, said, "With a visualiser, teachers can model complex tasks, annotate texts, or demonstrate problem-solving strategies in real time, ensuring that every student sees a clear, step-by-step example. Visualisers also support whole-class engagement by focusing attention on shared content, making lessons more interactive and collaborative.

They are invaluable for formative assessment, allowing teachers to display student work, provide immediate feedback, and address misconceptions on the spot. By streamlining lesson delivery and boosting clarity, visualisers not only improve outcomes for students but also make teaching more efficient and dynamic, whilst supporting workload and well-being."

Louise Priest, Senior Assistant Headteacher at St. Aidan's Catholic Academy, Sunderland said, "Visualisers enhance teaching and learning by fostering collaboration, critical thinking, and communication.

In Religious Education, for example, a visualiser can be used to display and annotate student interpretations of sacred texts, encouraging immediate feedback and group discussion. Teachers can also model essay structures or analyse religious art and symbols in real time, boosting understanding and engagement. By integrating visualisers, educators create dynamic lessons that support deeper learning and continuous improvement."



Healthy Lifestyles

Our Trust Health Board sees us collaborating with leading clinical professionals to develop a comprehensive strategy aimed at tackling a range of health issues including the rising levels of childhood obesity and improving dental health to prevent tooth decay and keep our children smiling. 
We are fortunate that each year in our region we host the biggest half marathon in the world – the Great North Run. 

Resilient school bounces back after RAAC crisis with glowing Ofsted report



A "close-knit and friendly" school in Hebburn, which was affected by the RAAC schools' crisis, has been praised by Ofsted for its "tireless" support of pupils to ensure they continued to receive the best education and pastoral care possible under unprecedented

Like many other schools across the country, St James' <u>Catholic Primary School</u>, which is part of Bishop Chadwick Catholic Education Trust, was forced to close to the Government's announcement in September 2032 that any school which had reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC) used in its buildings would have to close while safety mitigations were put in place.

Despite the challenges of having to close the school building and spreading children across different sites, every pupil received face-to-face education throughout

We have over two hundred governor and director posts within our Trust. These roles are all voluntary and we are very proud of our governor family and the contributions they make to supporting the education of the next generation.

But don't take our word for it, here we talk to Karen Shek. Governor at St. John Bosco Catholic Primary School, Sunderland.

How long have you been a governor? Just over a year.

What made you apply to become a governor? I saw schools' Facebook post promoting governor vacancies. For me I was interested in being the parent voice as I still have a child in school, and I wanted to be able to give back to the school for everything they have done for my children.

What commitment is involved? There are termly meetings at school. I try to attend as many as I can in person but if work commitments are an issue I am able to attend via TEAMS, this flexibility is really valuable.

How has the role helped your own development? During RAAC school was split between two sites. This was a difficult time and impacted staff morale. I decided to volunteer my free time to help in school and support staff wellbeing. Staff were so grateful to have me around, I didn't think I was helping much but, being there doing the smallest of jobs made a huge difference.

I also supported in class listening to pupils read, there were number of SEND children in class and I gravitated towards supporting them. Over the following months I found myself enjoying spending time engaging with the SEND pupils. Staff at school played a huge part in my personal development, giving me the confidence to apply to be a supply Teaching Assistant at a local special provision school. I have recently secured a permanent position as a Level 2 Teaching Assistant and am really enjoying my role.

What is the most rewarding part of the role? To be able to give my input on decisions that are being made within school and these being valued, being part of the school community and supporting pupils as they start their educational journeys.

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
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
